Market Overview

Goldman Sachs Dynamic Opportunities Limited ("GSDO" or the "Fund") returned 2.30% net¹ in the month of February (for the USD share class).

Fifteen out of nineteen managers in the portfolio posted positive returns.

Three out of four Relative Value managers finished the month positive. Equity market neutral strategies were strong contributors to performance in February, as value factors generated positive returns across geographies. Fixed income strategies generally profited from yield curve trading, while some credit-focused strategies detracted amidst continued market illiquidity. An Asia-focused manager trading volatility generated positive returns despite a fall in implied volatility due to successful positions in single stock volatility and credit default swaps. Another manager detracted as exposure to fixed income arbitrage and developed market strategies lead to negative returns.

Four out of six Event Driven managers generated positive performance in February. Even though credit markets remain stressed and substantial price decreases in the securitized sub-prime mortgages sector led to margin calls and meaningful losses in the asset class, there were several managers that were able to profit both by remaining defensively positioned and through sensible security selection. With spreads generally widening in the face of further uncertainty about viable financing options for buyouts and general market illiquidity, some managers identified potential capital structure arbitrage opportunities and long/short debt and credit trades. One manager generated strong positive returns despite poor performance in the global equity and credit markets, while a European-focused manager saw negative performance as long positions in those markets sold off.

Five out of six Equity Long/Short managers generated positive performance. Major equity markets oscillated throughout February, with most finishing down for the month. Better performance came in Asian and emerging markets as well as energy-related stocks. The sectors that positively contributed to performance included financials as well as media and telecoms. Underperforming managers had higher levels of net exposure to the United States, as well as long exposure to the industrial and technology sectors. One European-focused manager experienced losses through exposure to securities in consumer services. An emerging markets manager generated positive performance driven by net long exposure to Korea, Brazil, and global mining securities.

All three Tactical Trading managers experienced positive returns. Gains were generated equally by both systematic trading managers and discretionary traders. Systematic trading strategies benefited from a rally in commodities through long exposure to grains, energy, soft commodities and metals. Short U.S. dollar positions versus European currencies also contributed with the dollar reversing to the downside during the second half of the month. In discretionary trading, macro managers posted positive returns mainly driven by fixed income and currency trading. One manager benefited from performance driven by fixed income and volatility trading in the major currencies. A systematic trading manager saw minor losses in its short-term trading models, yet finished the month strongly positive as all other strategies generated gains.

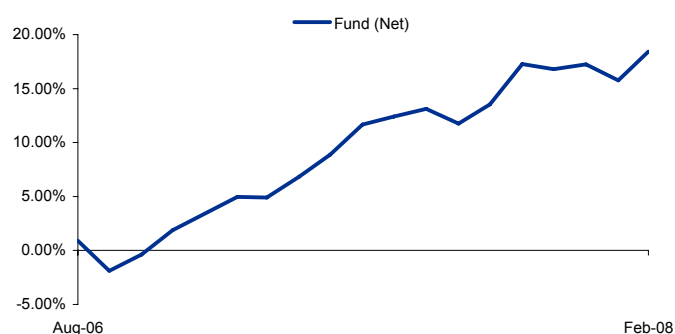

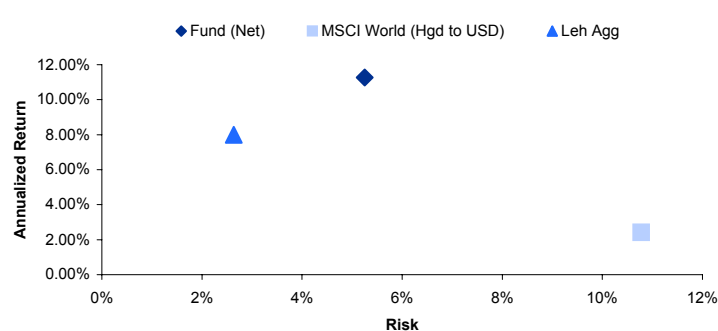

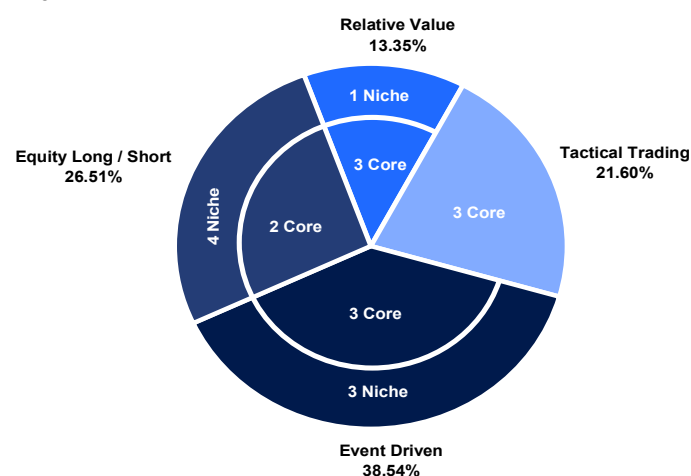

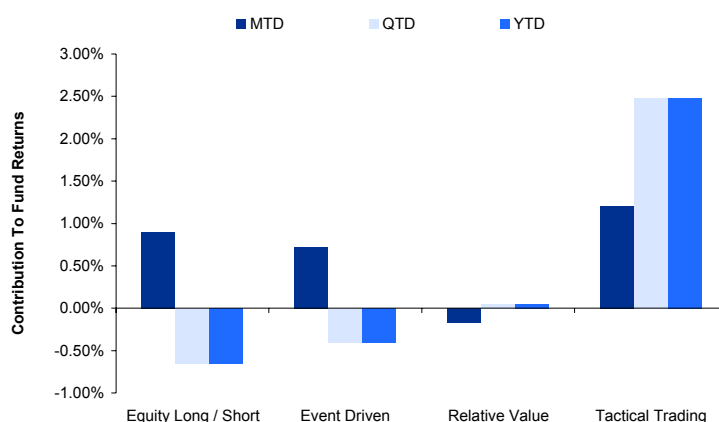
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Weights¹

Effect of fees on performance:

The following table provides a simplified example of the effect of management and incentive fees on portfolio returns. For example, assume a portfolio has a steady investment return, gross of fees, of 0.5% per month and total management fees of 0.1250% per month of the market value of the portfolio on the last day of the month and incentive fees of 10% of net profits. Management fees and incentive fees are deducted from the market value of the portfolio on that day. There are no cash flows during the period. The table shows that, assuming that other factors such as investment return and fees remain constant, the difference increases due to the compounding effect over time. Of course, the magnitude of the difference between gross-of-fee and net-of-fee returns will depend on a variety of factors, and the example has been intentionally simplified.
